**The Finance Committee recommends passage of Article 8 in the amount of \$38,104,378.00.**

**The Finance Committee, in conjunction with the Town Administrator, the School Committee, Department Heads, Boards and Commissions, has worked extremely hard these past couple of months to develop and bring forth an equitable and balanced budget for Fiscal Year 2009. The budget process has been challenging for all parties as not only is revenue growth slowing, but healthcare, retirement and sanitation costs are rising. The proposed FY09 budget listed in this article is a 3.74% or \$1,372,834 increase over prior year – of which healthcare, retirement and sanitation account for \$980,189 or 71.4% of the total increase. These town wide costs put the town in a difficult situation, forcing departments to put new hires, new equipment and new supplies on hold. This proposed budget will mean the elimination of existing positions on both the municipal and school sides, unfortunately we, as a town, must control our spending as much as possible, for FY10 and possibly FY11 will be even more challenging financial years for Grafton.**

**ARTICLE 9. FUND FY09 CAPITAL EXPENDITURE BUDTGET**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow, or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the purposes of funding the FY09 Capital Expenditure Budget, and said sum to be spent under the direction of the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator and various other departments, or to take any other action relative thereto.

Said appropriation authorizes the transfer of available funds and/or the Board of Selectmen to borrow said sum under M.G.L. Chapter 44, or any other enabling authority, provided that the Town acknowledges that the Massachusetts School Building Authority's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and any costs the Town of Grafton incurs in excess of any grant provided by and received from the MSBA shall be the sole responsibility of the Town and, further provided, that the appropriation hereunder shall be subject to and contingent upon an affirmative vote of the Town to exempt the amounts required for the payment of interest and principal on said borrowing from the limitations on taxes imposed by G.L. 59, s21C (Proposition 2 1/2), and, further provided, that the amount of borrowing authorized pursuant to this motion shall be reduced by any amounts received or expected to be received from the MSBA, or to take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to reauthorize the Town Accountant to continue the School Department revolving account pursuant to MGL c. 44, 53E ½ entitled "Early Childhood" for the purposes of receiving payments for tuition and to be used to pay expenses related to early childhood programs, including but not limited to personnel costs, materials, books, and supplies with an Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) limit that may be spent from such account in the ensuing fiscal year, or to take any other action relative thereto.
